

HISC 5 YEAR PLAN Process












Membership Income

Membership numbers declined 6% from 3,438 at the end of 2022 to 3,213 at the end of 2023, and at end of March membership stood at 2,926.

Membership Income for 2023 was £661,807, a rise of £37,208 over 2022; if membership numbers had held up, we could have expected income to be £687,059, a lost opportunity of £31,498.



Keeping the club going



The club generates enough cash to fund day to day operations, but we have a growing list of repairs and replacements that need to be funded.

Major Capex items looming:

- 1. Ferry / Pontoon
- 2. Stocker Block
- 3. Engine replacement programme (we have bought 4 new engines this year, but the rest of the stock is old and costly to maintain)
- 4. Main Building maintenance (e.g. life span of balcony) the building is now over 20 years old and repair bills are rising.

In 2023 we spent £305,345 on repairs and replacements to our buildings and boats etc.

To date in 2024 we have spent £186,000, including £100k for replacing the hot water and heating systems. We anticipate having to spend a further £180k on repairs and renewals this year.

With cumulative losses since 2016 of £376,000 we have limited cash reserves, without Covid by the end of this year we would have an overdraft.

We need to generate a further contribution in the region of £100k each year.

Parking developments since AGM 2023:







 park
- 2024 plans for the Archives team include the 80th Anniversary COPP Event/Dinner and the
 100th Anniversary of Chichester Harbour Federation Week



- Continue to implement our plans to develop trained and skilled volunteers for key Race Management roles
- Actively approaching classes with appropriate events to build our pipeline of events beyond 2026, and up to five years ahead
- Bidding for the Youth Nationals 2026
- Attendance at RYA Dinghy Show to promote the Club as a Championship venue
- Pro-active planning to ensure members can easily access the Club during large events

CHAMPIONSHIP VENUE - FORWARD PLANS



Parking developments since AGM 2023:

- Members' car park plaques being produced to enable better management of members v. visitor parking
- Currently working with a car park designer to maximise space and parking efficiency in both main and overflow car parks
- Looking to introduce a row of "limited mobility/white badge" spaces opposite Stocker block to be used for specific events/times
- Plan to block off the car park for dinghies as late as possible before an event ideally Thursday at the earliest.
- Plans for temporary movement of boats to release space behind Dunes for parking/visiting boats based upon entry numbers and types of boats competing
- Width of the sandbanks on the causeway lagoon side to be returned to original depth to enable cars to park nose in
- Layout of parking area just north of RNLI station to be improved to gain spaces, with "dumped" boats and trailers pushed together
- Plan to use area beyond the overflow park for temporary trailer parking
- New ANPR barrier for the overflow car park.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY PRINCIPLES



"Ensuring financial sustainability for the Club, its resources and facilities"

- Deliver sustainable cash flows to enable the Club to meet its current and future objectives
- Consider fund raising as an acceptable income stream
- Consider alternative income streams/funding arrangements to fund specific capital expenditure
- Grow our membership without undermining the offering
- Maximise the use of Club land for the benefit of the Club, its members and visitors
- Ensure effective and cost-efficient crew team structure and working practices
- Maximise revenue generation from the Club facilities
 - from non-member activities with minimal impact on the membership, e.g. at off-peak times.
- Continue digital developments to support communications, marketing and operational efficiency and effectiveness
- Embrace long term planning and future thinking to ensure Club assets are well maintained and renewed where necessary
- Ensure the Club and its operations meet all relevant statutory obligations

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY - 2023 ACHIEVEMENTS



- £18K accounting surplus a £50K positive uplift from 2022.
- Cash generation of £58k.
- Income did not keep up with inflation profitability came from better control of costs despite lower demand and revenue in 2023.
- New engine & rib tube replacement plan implemented.
- Relationship established with new planning officer for discussions about our land, overflow car park, etc.

Challenges

- HISC needs to generate £100K+ surplus each year to fund the continued regeneration of our assets. We generate enough to run the club on a daily basis, but not enough to fund all future capital requirements.
- The seasonality of winter v summer trading is materially significant with losses over the winter months in the region of £130k, which means we rely on a "good summer" to generate a surplus
- Declining members numbers (down 6% in 2023). Without positive action, this decline could continue, particularly in light of the general economic outlook.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY - FORWARD PLANS



- Develop a long term plan for the Stocker building
- Investigate options regarding the future of the pontoon
- Continued focus and implementation of plans to improve parking availability for members at peak times
- Finalise and implement plans for most effective new ferry service
- ANPR barrier to overflow car park to be installed March 2024
- Hot water & central heating existing plant to be replaced with new installation including 3 new Ideal 120kW boilers and 2 new 400 litre buffer vessels.
- Agree a flood protection plan (for North side of the Estate) so that regulatory approvals can be sought.
- Replace the causeway existing gabions to protect the integrity of the causeway
- Determine the way forward for the entrance access road
- Develop replacement options for guttering & downpipes
- Develop investment plans for environmental initiatives
- Research the position on Club incorporation

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY - LEGACY PROJECT



The need

The club struggles to make enough annual surpluses to fund large capital projects e.g. boats, sea defences, tractors, electric car chargers.

Current fund Raising

The 500 club and HISST [a registered charity] have raised regular but relatively modest funds over the last 20 years that have contributed to repairing sea defences, youth sailing, bar furniture, AV equipment, binoculars, trophy cabinets and many other 'nice to have' items.

History of Fundraising and Legacy Giving

Over the years both the membership at large and some individual members have also made donations to;

- Buy the land and the old clubhouse in 1959.
- Build the sea defences on the eastern beach;
- Purchase a new flagpole.
- Match the funding for a lottery grant to build the current clubhouse.
- Buy new safety boats.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY - LEGACY PROJECT



Moving Forward

We need to enable a co-ordinated effort that energises the 500 Club and HISTT and promotes a legacy giving offer to the membership. A Legacy Fund Steering Group has therefore been formed, comprising:

Handling Donations

It is anticipated that members will be able to:

- Donate funds for specific schemes or items.
- Pass funds to HISST for their charitable aims. [youth and sea defences.]
- Join the 5000 club.
- Make a legacy donation in their will.
- Act anonymously if they wish

ENVIRONMENT - FORWARD PLANS



- Further implementation of actions to reduce single use plastics and work towards silver accreditation from The Final Straw, based on their updated framework.
- Implement agreed contract changes with our waste collectors to enable better separation of recyclable items which allows cans and plastic to be collected.
- Continued focus on Chichester Harbour Race Week and Youth Race Week as high-profile green events.
- Continued communications and education via newsletter, website and specific events.
- Work with the cruising community to minimise environmental impact of their harbour activities, including winter lay-up.
- Focus on reduced water use on site, including identifying and fixing leaks in hosepipes and minimizing time in showers.
- Continued research on environmental initiatives for progression when funding available.
- Maintain close liaison with the Conservancy, CHaPRON, Coastal Partnerships with regard to coastal management.
- Aim to align with new Chichester Harbour Federation environmental guidelines.
- Develop relationship and plan with Bird Aware.
