

### The Beak Game (to be played with adult supervision)

#### What you need:

- A pair of tweezers
- A small Tupperware box
- A few handfuls of rice or sand
- A few strands of spaghetti or ~ 20cm of string
- A watch/clock
- A printer or a piece of paper and a pen

#### How to set up:

- Break the spaghetti or cut the string up into approximately 1cm pieces
- Bury the spaghetti pieces or string underneath the rice in a Tupperware box
- Print out the 'feed me' diagram (on page 2 of this pack), or draw your own bird mouth on a piece of paper, and place it beside your Tupperware box

#### How to play:


- During this game you are going to pretend to be a hungry bird do a bird imitation, flap those wings!
- Take the tweezers and practice closing and opening them this is your beak!
- See how many pieces of spaghetti/string you can find and collect with the tweezers in 20 seconds. Make a pile inside the bird mouth.
